

The school rowing program is now well underway for the season, with an impressive **246 boys** enrolled under the guidance of Director of Rowing, **Mr Tom Woodruff** and his team of assistant coaches led by **Charlie Dixon ('12 and Stroke of the Crew)** who returns to Scotch after four years at St Kevin's. Charlie is Teacher in Charge of Rowing and Year 9As coach. In addition to his rowing responsibilities, Charlie is a form teacher and teaching History and PE in the Middle School.

The Cardinal Club held two BBQs at the Boatshed in October to welcome parents to the new season. The club has also arranged for all parents to receive a copy of the SCBC Rowing Handbook, with support from Tom Woodruff and the Scotch College Boat Club.

We would also like to congratulate Old Boys Marcus Emmett ('19) and Fraser Miscamble ('19), who proudly represented Australia at the World Rowing Championships in Shanghai in September. Their achievements continue the strong Scotch rowing legacy. The Scotch College Boat Club got the season off to a strong start at the **Melbourne Head** on 15 November, with wins to the First Eight and a number of senior crews. There were strong results for the current Year Nine boys in their first race in an eight, as well as current Year Eight boys competing in quads for the first time.

The Melbourne Head was followed by the 2025 Schoolgirls & Schoolboys Regatta at Nagambie on Saturday 22 November, with all current Year 8, 9, 10 and 11 rowers competing. The senior crews won all divisions, and there were strong performances from the Year 9 boys in their first 2000-metre race in eights, and the Year 8 boys in the quads on their first visit to Nagambie.

With a strong start to the 2026 season, it promises to be a big year as the School celebrates its 175th Anniversary.

A number of events are planned to celebrate this milestone, including the **Don Macmillan Cocktail Party** on **Wednesday 11 March 2026** — which also celebrates the anniversary crews (2016, 2006, 1996, 1986, etc.).

Boat Club Report

As Term Four began, the 2025-2026 rowing season commenced with large numbers of students arriving at the Boat Sheds. A big cohort of Year 7 students have begun their rowing experience, learning the fundamentals under the watchful eye of **Mr O'Connor** and coaches. The Year 8 rowers are also well underway, rowing in 13 quad sculls. They have been joined by coxswains from Year 6 who are keen to begin their involvement in the sport. **Mr Dixon**, Teacher in Charge of Rowing, has coordinated this level while coaching the 9A crew, alongside his work throughout the Boat Club. Rowers in Year 9 (the Year 10 Eights for 2026) have formed five Eights, and have been working hard alongside the five Senior Eights made up of Year 10 and 11 students. Staff member **Katie Isles** has continued to oversee these rowers.

The Melbourne Head Regatta marked the first race of the season for boys in Year 11, 10, 9, and also for four Year 8 crews. This regatta is a 'head race' where crews are timed from Herring Island to MUBC in the city. The day proved to be an exciting opening to the season as Scotch crews raced alongside 800 crews and 2740 rowers of all ages and boat classes. The First Eight won the Schoolboy Division 1 from Xavier and Melbourne Grammar, with Brighton Grammar, Geelong College, St Kevin's, Carey and Geelong Grammar not far behind. The Second Eight placed fourth in the Schoolboy Division 2, with Brighton Grammar, Xavier, and Melbourne Grammar ahead. The Third Eight won the Schoolboy Eight Division 3, ahead of Wesley, Xavier, Brighton Grammar. The Scotch College Fourth Eight placed 5th in this same division, ahead of Geelong College, Xavier, St Kevin's, with the Scotch College Fifth Eight then in 9th place ahead of the Xavier 5th and 6th Eights and the Geelong Grammar 4th and 5th Eights.

In the Year 9 Eight Division, the Year 10 Eights for 2026 raced each other, with the Scotch College 10A crew placing first ahead of Melbourne Grammar, Sydney Grammar, Xavier and Wesley. Following in sixth place was the Scotch 10B crew, in 16th place the Scotch 10C Crew, in 22nd place the Scotch 10D crew, and in 24th place the 10E Eight. Later in the day four Year 8 quad sculls had their first experience of racing at a regatta, with the 9A and B Quads achieving placings of 6th and 3rd respectively in the Year 8 Division 1 Quad Scull. The 9D crew achieved a memorable victory in the Division 2 race, ahead of the 9C crew in 4th place.


Following the Melbourne Head Regatta the Boat Club welcomed **Sandra** and **Sandy Marshall** back to present the T Shirts and medals to the winning Scotch Third Crew. Both Sandy and Sandra are active supporters of the rowing community and sponsored the Third Eight Division in honour and memory of their son **Campbell Marshall ('19)**. Campbell rowed at Scotch and passed away tragically. Both Sandy and Sandra spoke with the Third Eight, congratulating them on their performance, and talked about Campbell's life and rowing experience, before making the presentation of medals and T Shirts.

The following week all rowers in Year 8-11 raced at a Schools Regatta at Nagambie. The First, Second, Third and Fourth Senior crews all managed to record first place in their respective divisions. The Fifth Eight were able to finish ahead of the Xavier Fifth crew while racing in the Fourth Division. The Year 9 Eights (our 2026 Year 10 crews) raced strongly, the 10A crew placing 5th, the 10B crew finishing in 1st place, the 10C crew third and the 10D crew 2nd in their divisions. Absences and illness meant the 10E crew raced in a four, placing 6th in their race. The Year 8 Quad Sculls also raced, the 1st quad placed 4th, and the 3rd quad 2nd, with the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 6th 7th, 8th crews winning their divisions. The 10th crew won Division 9 with the 9th crew close behind, and the 13th crew won the Division 10 with the 11th and 12th crews in 2nd and 3rd place. Throughout the day the Cardinal Club were on site and provided a focal point for parents and supporters, while also providing food for rowers. It was an exciting day of racing for all rowers and coxswains.



The tour was arranged following a similar tour of the Memorial Hall hosted by OSHC and it was felt that as the boatshed area was generally unfamiliar to many in the Scotch Family, it provided another opportunity for Scotch Family members to view the school property. Guests included Old Boys from across the decades and parents of more recent rowers.

Guests were welcomed by **Neil Lucas**, President of OSHC and **Phil Wright**, Cardinal Club Treasurer and Club Captain and long-standing SCBC coach. Phil introduced **Lachie Phillips** current coach / boatman and cox of the 2021 1st VIII who took guests in to the sheds and boatmen's workshop to explain a few things about our current fleet.
